
Overview of Emergency Solutions Grant-Coronavirus (ESG-CV) Funding

The \$18 million allocated for North Carolina is the first installment from the CARES Act and must be spent by Sept 30, 2022. Applications are due July 17th at 5:00 P.M. A second ESG-CV allocation with a future RFA must be spent by Sept 30, 2022. The RFA for the regular annual allocation for FY2021 (January to December 2021) has yet to be released.

Crisis Response Application Overview

The funding is broken into two categories: Crisis Response (street outreach, emergency shelter) and Housing Stabilization (rapid rehousing, homelessness prevention).

- There are typical eligibility requirements for coordinated entry, HMIS, and written standards.
- Regions looked at a list of applicants from their region with funding amounts and provided priority and recommendations.



NC BoS CoC added time frames for 2020, 2021, and 2022 in the budget to assist:

- Agencies plan for an extended time period
- · Agencies request funding for a shorter time period, if future planning is difficult
- CoC to make funding decisions for current RFA and future funding

- Jim Cox asked how Region 12 was below the 40% mark.
 - Brian responded that Greenville Community Shelter filled out their budget form incorrectly. Their application was only for \$30,000, which was the amount that they designated for 2020 in the budget form. However, they filled out what they were projecting to need for 2021 and 2022 that the application said they would apply for in the next ESG-CV RFA. Staff adjusted the amount for the selection and will ask them to correct the budget form, which should only include



what they are applying for in this round. When staff initially looked at the information for last week's Steering Committee meeting, we had not looked at the applications themselves. We only looked at the Smartsheet information (and If they didn't fill that out, we looked at the budget form itself). Staff did not recommend lower funding than was requested. We only adjusted to what they had in their application.

2 Regions had Crisis Response Application Requests Over 40%

Region 1: Southwest

• 3 applicants

Crisis Response Allocation: \$170,611.20
Crisis Response Applications: \$210,305.60

Region 7

2 applicants

Crisis Response Allocation: \$493,495.20
Crisis Response Applications: \$636,429.00

In regions where applications were higher than 40%, staff reviewed annual budget allocations for 2020, 2021, and 2022.

• Staff removed all funding from 2022.

Region 1: REACH of Macon County

Removed \$12,461.22 allocated for 2022

Final selected application budget: \$70,844.38

Region 7: Outreach Missions

Removed \$206,652 allocated for 2022

Final selected application budget: \$346,531.00

Both agencies will be able to apply for removed 2022 funding in ESG-CV-2 RFA(s)

2 applications were not selected due to problems with program design and thresholds.

Franklin-Vance-Warren Opportunity

- Applied for ES and SO
- Application focused on homelessness prevention rather than eligible Crisis Response activities
 - Demonstrates lack of understanding ESG admin and program requirements
- 8 unmet, 4 partially met standards and thresholds of 22 total
- Projected outcomes do not align with budgeted funding
 - 40 households with \$87,000

Mercer Foundation

- Applied for very small SO project (\$6,000)
- Application focused on Housing Stabilization activities rather than Crisis Response activities.

- Demonstrates lack of understanding ESG admin and program requirements
- 8 unmet, 3 partially met standards and thresholds of 22 total
- · Project outcomes do not align with budgeted funding
 - 60 individuals served with \$6,000

Staff recommend a 'No' for now and will reach out to both agencies to understand and prepare better applications for future RFAs.

- Jim Cox asked if there is an appeals process.
 - Brian responded that one had not been put into place, but we could include something in the notifications to the projects not selected. Although, the turnaround would be rapid and would require reconvening the Steering Committee.
 - Angela Harper King added that an appeals process should have been decided from the beginning.
 - Brian gave context for how the CoC appeals process works. Those that appeal
 can only make an appeal based on the process not being followed. Appeal
 requests cannot ask for a change in decision based on information not included
 in the submitted materials.
 - Brian asked if there was more conversation. None expressed. Brian stated we would create an appeals process for the next allocation.

A motion was made to approve the recommended slate of applicants as presented by staff [Henson, Martin]. Melissa McKeown, Kristen Martin, Lakitra Claude, and LaTonya Penny abstained. All in favor, none opposed.

NCCEH requests that NC BoS CoC apply for HMIS funds from ESG-CV

Still not word from the state about other funding sources.

- NC BoS CoC has an HMIS shortfall of \$151,423.
- NC BoS CoC has \$414,438.90 still available in Crisis Response.
- NCCEH requests to apply for \$151,423 on NC BoS CoC's behalf for HMIS Lead activities

Melissa McKeown stated these funds benefit the whole CoC, and she is in favor of this application. A motion was made to approve NCCEH to apply for up to \$151,423 for HMIS Lead activities on behalf of the NC BoS CoC [McKeown, Edwards]. All in favor, none opposed.
