Dear Secretary Cohen:

We write on behalf of the over 8500 North Carolinians experiencing homelessness that we serve, believing that NC DHHS should prioritize shelter staff and guests with group one for COVID vaccinations given the residential and high risk nature of this work.

The CDC in an update on 2/2/21, states that . . .

"Homeless services are often provided in congregate settings, which could facilitate the spread of infection, including infection caused by the virus that causes COVID-19. Because many people who are homeless are older adults or have underlying medical conditions, they may also be at increased risk for severe illness. . . Because of the increased risk described above, some states have prioritized people experiencing homelessness and homeless service staff in earlier vaccination phases (https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/community/homeless-shelters/vaccination-guidance.html)."

We believe that allowing early access to vaccinations for both shelter staff and shelter guests aligns with this guidance. It is our understanding that members of the North Carolina Coalition to End Homelessness (NCCEH) advocated for the inclusion of shelter staff and guests in group one but that these groups were not prioritized in group one when the vaccination schedule was released. We urge NC DHHS to reconsider this decision as soon as possible.

Given the federal emphasis on deploying the vaccine with an eye towards racial equity, it should be noted that, while people who identify as Black make up only 19% of the entire population in the NC Balance of State Continuum of Cares's 79 counties, the percentage of people who identify as Black increase when looking at homelessness (37%), and especially families (45%). Allowing shelter guests and staff to move up to group one also aligns with the NC DHHS' stated goal to ensure that people of color are not left behind in the vaccination process.

Finally, many homeless service providers have been forced to use a dual-site model with a significant number of guests off-site in hotels and other temporary arrangements because of health risks associated with full occupancy in congregate living facilities where physical distancing is a challenge. Early vaccinations of staff and shelter guests will help these agencies return to a single-site model and will save considerable public resources.

It is clear over the last several weeks that changes have been made to the vaccination prioritization process to correct mistakes, incorporate flexibility, and ensure that vaccinations proceed state-wide in a timely and orderly manner. Together from across the state, we ask that NC DHHS act quickly to revise the State's prioritization guidelines to include shelter staff and guests in due haste. We appreciate your consideration in this matter as supported by the following 94 organizations and 301 individuals across the State of North Carolina. Thank you for your service to the State and its residents.
