2023 Point-In-Time Count


Data:

- Data Center submitted Point-In-Time Count data of the total people experiencing homelessness on January 25, 2023 in the NC Balance of State CoC to HUD.
- 2023 Point-in-Time count by region and county will be posted at <u>ncceh.org/datacenter/pitdata</u>
- 2023 Housing Inventory Count is already on the website.

Data Review:


Point-in-Time Count data is a reflection of who we could count as experiencing homelessness in a one night census.

• Reviewed NC BoS CoC Point-in-Time Count data from 2010 – 2023:



*Unsheltered data was not collected in 2021 due to the pandemic

- Unsheltered data for the NC BoS CoC was not collected in 2021 due to the pandemic, NC BoS CoC was given a waiver.
- Total 2023 Count (including Unsheltered, Emergency Shelter, and Transitional Housing): 3311;
 1,314 were unsheltered; 253 were chronically homeless.

Race/**Ethnicity** by Total Population, Population in Families with Children by Poverty

- The Data Center is working on publishing a report with this data to the Steering Committee later this summer.
- For the entire NC BoS CoC, 19% of people from the census (general population) identify as Black whereas 42% of people experiencing sheltered homelessness identified as Black and 27% of people experiencing unsheltered homelessness identified as Black. The people experiencing

sheltered and unsheltered homelessness in the NC BoS CoC disproportionally identify as Black compared to the general population. This disparity triggered some Coordinated Entry Assessment tool reform. In the NC BoS CoC we are piloting a new Coordinated Entry Assessment tool that will take into account racial disparities. The NC BoS CoC Racial Equity Subcommittee is looking at this data. The disparity is even more significant in families experiencing unsheltered homelessness with 59% identifying as Black.



Race/Ethnicity by Total Population, Population in Families with Children by

- For the entire NC BoS CoC, 9% of people from the census (general population) identify as Hispanic (and the Census Bureau believes there was an undercount in 2020 of people who identify as Hispanic) whereas 7% of people experiencing sheltered homelessness in the NC BoS CoC identify as Hispanic (the Data Center believes the NC BoS CoC has had an undercount here), but is a bit higher than in previous years. This increase could be due to our CoC's work on creating welcoming spaces, emphasizing language access, and accessibility of services. The data reflects a more significant underrepresentation of those experiencing unsheltered homelessness who identify as Hispanic at 4%.
- The group discussed what can be done to address disparities? Raised issues of trust, and language access. The Racial Equity Subcommittee is highlighting language access through the Racial Equity Dialogue Series. The Racial Equity Subcommittee is looking at more to do in this area making sure providers understand our responsibilities around access, sharing resources, federal funding expenses, and language translation vs interpretation. It is important that we include focusing on equity in terms of race and ethnicity in our scorecards; how we evaluate the performance of our system and promote justice and equity.
- The group recognized regional differences in general population census data in terms of race and ethnicity. This regional data will be in the Data Center's report for folks to use later this summer. All of this data is important for FPS in our work making funding and performance decisions and we continue to see disparities. So, the work continues.

• NC BoS CoC Point-in-Time Count by Region:





Gap: 22 Counties reported 0 sheltered clients during Point-in-Time Count. Discussed barriers to accessing shelters due to distance from where folks are experiencing homelessness, lack of transportation. Some folks are working where they are experiencing homelessness and do not want to leave that county to go to a shelter. Applying for non-congregate shelter (hotel/motel stays) through ESG could provide some assistance



 27 Counties reported 0 people experiencing unsheltered homelessness during Point-In-Time Count. Work on Unsheltered Access Coordination will hopefully help address this count next year. Recognition that Unsheltered Access Coordination is needed and yet is an unfunded position in each region. Andrea referenced the Back@Home- NC BoS CoC, Special NOFO, RFA that has been released to address rural and unsheltered homelessness.


- NC BoS CoC Point-in-Time Count: Subpopulations

 Methodology is likely causing an undercount of chronic homelessness across the CoC. Using Coordinated Entry for the unsheltered count and not having chronic homelessness determined or getting history of homelessness and disabling condition. Still working to increase having this information as people are worked with year-round and capturing this data.



2023 Housing Inventory Count:

The Housing Inventory Count is an estimate of Bed Capacity [ES, TH, RRH, PSH, Other PH without services (like Emergency Housing Vouchers, Housing Choice Voucher Set-aside that are resources dedicated to people experiencing homelessness but doesn't have supportive services)]; does not include folks experiencing unsheltered homelessness.


HMIS Bed Coverage

HMIS Bed Coverage


- RRH, PSH, OPH who were we supporting in a unit on the night of the count.

HMIS Bed Coverage


• FPS should keep in mind that when we talk about System Performance Measures or Longitudinal Study Analysis that the non-HMIS bed and VSP beds are not included.

HMIS Bed Coverage – changes since 2020


- Surge in funding from covid in 2021 required HMIS participation. In 2022, some covid funding ended. In 2023, we increased HMIS beds.

2023 HIC HMIS Participation by Region



HMIS Bed Coverage without Victim Service Providers




HMIS Bed Coverage without VSPs

- Without VSPs, there is an increase in coverage rates.

• HUD wants to see the HMIS Participation rate reach the threshold of at least 85%.

• 2023 HIC HMIS Participation without Victim Service Providers by Region: Want to target those in light blue (non-HMIS) to participate in HMIS.

FPS discussed ways to increase HMIS Participation Rate to 75% for ES (currently at 63%; although HUD's goal is 85%); 45% for TH (TH HMIS Participation Rate has been achieved).

- Develop Non-congregate shelters (hotel/motel stays) using ESG funds.
- FPS page on the NCCEH website has an HMIS Recruitment section with the non-HMIS HIC listed there.
- Barriers/challenges to participating in HMIS tend to include staff capacity, funding, and training time.
 - Consider how FPS member agencies overcame these barriers to address these challenges.
 - There has been some increase in the TH HMIS participation rate.
 - Training has improved with Learning Management System (no longer in-person, allday training; although some agencies are requesting this again), but it is a lot at the beginning. There is a training feedback survey.
- Regional Lead Alternate lead for HMIS Participation recruitment. Non-HMIS HIC gets sent to Regional Lead Alternates with sample scripts, Frequently Asked Questions, and HMIS agencies to offer peer-to-peer support: all in the Increasing HMIS Bed Coverage Procedures document on the FPS page. Also, NC BoS CoC is not getting the HMIS recruitment reports quarterly from Regional Lead Alternates. How do we get more agencies participating so we can look at System Performance Measures that include more of those agencies really participating in the system?
