Supportive Housing Development Program

Funds housing with supportive services for households with special needs earning less than 60% of area median income.

Eligible Applicants

- Nonprofit organizations (in operation at least three years)
- Local Governments
- Housing Authorites

Type of Housing

- Emergency Shelter
- Substance abuse treatment facilities
- Permanent Housing
- Emergency Shelter Rehabilitation (building must be owned by nonprofit or local government)

Eligible Populations

- Homeless
- Non-Homeless with disabilities, including mental illness, development disabilities, physical disabilities, substance abuse, HIV/AIDS, etc.
- Re-entry housing from corrections
- Youth aging out of foster care
- Survivors of domestic violence

Type of Funding

- Maximum funding capped at 50% of Total Development Cost in Large Entitlement Communities, 60% in Small and 70% in Nonentitlement Communities
- 20 year and 30 year 0% Loans up to \$500,000, \$600,000 or \$700,000 depending on location
- One funding cycle a year, deadline in February

Application Process

- Site visit required prior to application
- Applicant must have development capacity
- Site Control required option recommended
- Preliminary Design required
- Supportive Services Plan required
