2016-17: \$30.66 million


- Housing Trust Fund: \$7.66 million

- Orange County \$5 million






10-year NC Housing Tax Credit Average: \$35 million

North Carolina receives ~\$43 million each year in CDBG funding for rural counties



Governor Cooper's Budget Proposal

2017-18: \$33 million

- Housing Trust Fund: \$10 million
- HOME match: \$3 million
- Workforce Housing Loan Program: \$20 million

2018-19: \$13 million

- Housing Trust Fund: \$10 million
- HOME match: \$3 million
- Workforce Housing Loan Program: \$0 million



NC Housing Coalition Budget Request

OPPOSE - Manufactured Home Purchase Agreement Changes (S522/H685)

These bills **eliminate protections** that require manufactured home dealers to:

- Document all the money that changes hands in the deal; and
- Allow the borrower to get their money back if the financing falls through.

Due to strong bipartisan opposition, neither of these bills met the crossover deadline.



SUPPORT - Community Opportunity Tax Credit (H885)

The Opportunity Credit is a proven economic development strategy used by several other states, including South Carolina, that provides:

- a 33% credit against state tax liabilities
- incentivizes investment in state-certified
 Community Based Development Organizations
 ("CBDOs") to create jobs and develop affordable
 housing in underserved communities; and
- is capped at \$5 million.



Federal Budget – President Trump's Budget Proposal

Budget proposal cut HUD by **\$6.2 billion**, 13.2% of the agency's budget.

In FY2015 North Carolina received **\$868.2 million from HUD** supporting more than 11,000 NC jobs.

HUD Funding

FY2017 HUD Funding: Homeless Assistance Grants

- \$2.38 billion for Homeless Assistance Grants (CoC and ESG are one line item)
 - □ \$133 million increase over 2016.
 - □ \$2.02 billion for CoC , a \$65 million increase over 2016.
 - ☐ Again included \$43 million for youth demonstration grants in 11 communities, 5 of which have to be rural.

FY2017 HUD Funding: Housing Choice Vouchers

- \$18.36 billion to renew Housing Choice Vouchers
 - □ \$450 million short of what's needed to renew vouchers in use. So we will likely see some PHAs reduce their numbers this year.
 - □ \$40 million for new HUD-VASH
 - □ \$7 million to renew Tribal HUD-VASH. If that's more than needed then they can use the extra money to issue new Tribal HUD-VASH vouchers.
 - □ \$10 million for new Family Unification Program Vouchers.
 - □ \$120 million for Section 811 Mainstream vouchers for people with disabilities. This is apparently more than needed to renew all mainstream vouchers, and will create about 700-800 new vouchers.


FY2017 HUD Funding: USICH extended for one year

Two main threats to HUD funding:

- President's budget
- Total funding for non-defense discretionary programs


Back up. What the heck is NDD?

- Federal spending is split into two basic categories:
 - □ Mandatory programs continue unless Congress intervenes
 - Food Stamps, Medicaid, Social Security
 - Most of the Federal Budget
 - □ Discretionary spending for programs must re-decided each year or they stop.
 - Failure to pass appropriations bills results in a "government shutdown"

Back up. What the heck is NDD?

- Discretionary spending is further split:
 - □ Defense
 - □ Non-Defense
- □ Non-defense includes everything else:
 - □ Government employee salaries
 - □ HUD, USDA, Education, NIH, WIC, SAMHSA, etc, etc, etc.

Budget Control Act limits NDD funding



There are also corresponding Defense caps

Trump's budget request

- Proposes big bump in military spending, offset by big cut in NDD (even below BCA sequester levels)
 - □ Cut HUD by \$6 billion compared to FY2016 (so that's a bigger cut compared to FY2017)
 - ☐ Eliminates HOME, CDBG, and others

Trump's budget request

- Unlikely Congress will go for it.
- Key question: Will Congress preserve Defense/Non-Defense "parity"?
 - □ Every year after 2013 there has been a bi-partisan deal to lift both the defense and non-defense caps.

Unclear where this leaves HUD

- Just staying at BCA sequester levels will cause pain, certainly cause reductions in people receiving assistance.
- But Congress can make choices about where to cut.
 HUD has traditionally more bi-partisan programs than other areas.
