### **DHHS Partners Announcement – Back@Home**

At the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services (NCDHHS), we recognize that housing stability is closely tied to safety and well-being. Changes to rental assistance can create uncertainty and emotional stress for individuals, families, and the providers who support them.

Unfortunately, to remain in federal compliance and protect the long-term integrity of the program, we must implement a faster transition of beneficiaries off federal Rapid Rehousing (RRH) funds. Based on corrected budget projections from the Housing Collaborative, NCDHHS has determined that remaining RRH funds are insufficient to continue rental assistance at current levels without exceeding HUD-approved grant limits.

This decision is not related to household behavior, provider performance, or the effectiveness of the Back@Home program. Housing placements themselves are not being terminated by the program. Rental assistance is ending due to funding limitations. This acceleration will not impact western counties impacted by Hurricane Helene.

NCDHHS is working closely with service providers to ensure households receive advance notice, continued case management support, and assistance with planning for rent and utility responsibilities. These supports are to help households navigate this transition with as much stability and dignity as possible. Unhoused households will continue to receive supportive services and remain connected to Coordinated Entry for future housing opportunities.

We recognize that this news may be difficult, and that transitions like this can feel destabilizing. NCDHHS remains committed to transparency, compassion, and respectful communication as this transition moves forward.

### **Governance Implementation – Heather Dillashaw and Shovana McCalep**

HUD TA congratulated the NC Balance of State Continuum of Care on the revision and adoption of its updated Governance Charter.

The next phase of governance implementation will be the formation of a small workgroup to establish the Governing Board. As part of this transition, the term “Steering Committee” will be phased out and replaced by the Governing Board.

### **Board Composition**

- The NC Balance of State Continuum of Care (CoC) Governing Board shall consist of not fewer than 17 and not more than 29 members
- Each of the 13 CoC regions shall have one designated representative serving on the Board
- Remaining seats shall be allocated to representatives of key partner sectors, person with lived experience of homelessness, and at-large members as determined by the Board to ensure compliance with HUD representation requirements and balance of expertise



NCCEH and HUD TA emphasized the importance of addressing regions that currently lack stable leadership and noted that it is critical for the Governing Board to have strong leadership to ensure that every region is adequately represented.

Regions that are struggling with stable leadership are strongly encouraged to reach out to Heather Dillashaw and Shavona McCalep, as this will directly affect how your region is represented in important decision-making processes, including funding decisions.

**Vote on GDP Letter of Support for Rowan Helping Ministries**

The information submitted for the Letter of Support was included in the consent agenda and board packet. Melissa Hewitt motioned to approve, and Dr. Dia Thomas seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

**CoC Competition & Priority Listing Vote****CoC Competition Updates**

On January 9th, HUD re-opened the 2-Year FY2024 & FY2025 Notice of Funding Opportunity. This reversion put all CoCs back under the guidance of the previous NOFO, which was centered around the typical guidance we know from HUD (before2025), including Housing First, optional participation in services, and compliance with the Equal Access Rule. Additionally, the 2-Year NOFO did not include any funding caps on permanent housing (PSH & RRH) and changed our Tier 1 cap back to 90% of our Annual Renewal Demand.

This means the NC BoS CoC will **not** be updating our Written Standards, Anti-Discrimination Policy, and other materials that CoC grantees are expected to adopt. However, we expect changes will be necessary during the FY2026 Competition.

**During the second year of the 2-Year NOFO (FY2025):**

- There was no CoC or DV Bonus funding released, meaning we could only apply for new projects with funding made available by reallocation from existing projects.
- Existing projects who applied as either a new applicant or renewal applicant in FY2024 are not required to take any steps. HUD will be considering their FY2024 application for renewal in this competition.
- Many CoCs were thus not required to submit a FY2025 Priority Listing. However, NC BoS CoC *is* required to submit a Priority Listing since we are applying to renew our five FY2022 Special NOFO projects– Rural RRH & PSH and Unsheltered SSO, RRH & PSH under NC Department of Health and Human Services.
  - These five projects were originally awarded with 3-year grant terms, meaning they did not participate in the FY2024 Competition.

**Abbreviated Competition**

Since we had one month to conduct a local CoC Program Competition and existing grantees were not required to submit a FY2025 renewal project application, we had to make adjustments to our typical process for rating project's performance over the past year and creating our FY2025 Priority Listing.

Without the time needed to update our Scorecards to consider FY2024 projects and FY2022 Special NOFO projects, our Project Review Committee (PRC) met on January 16 and determined certain “Key Indicators of Performance” (pulled from our existing renewal scorecard) to help compare projects to create a Priority Listing.

Key indicators included: grant utilization rate over most recent complete operating year, APR submission timeliness, APR performance benchmarks (positive exits, increasing income, etc.), participation in Coordinated Entry, and participation in HMIS.

### **Creating the Priority Listing**

These “Key Indicators” were also paired with a heat map developed by NCCEH’s consultants, Liz Danley and Michelle Kennedy. The heat map was a visual tool to understand the coverage area of our CoC & ESG-funded projects compared to the number of people experiencing homelessness, as identified by the Point in Time Count.

The Project Review Committee used these Key Indicators to create two versions of the FY2025 Priority Listing. Based on the fact that existing grantees are “auto renewing” and we only have to create a Priority Listing because of our FY2022 Special NOFO (SNOFO) projects, NCCEH is under the impression that our FY2025 Priority Listing must only include the SNOFO projects that are submitting a FY2025 renewal project application.

However, since we had not received an informative response from the official NOFO desk, our Project Review Committee also created a Priority Listing with SNOFO projects and the FY2024 projects. Producing both versions prepared us for either scenario. We have since learned that only our SNOFO projects must be included on the Priority Listing.

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These priority listings were created before new information was made available by DHHS; therefore, the vote was recommended to be tabled. Dr. Agard requested that the PRC group remain after the Steering Committee meeting to take a vote once the additional information is available.

Erin Joy Crossfield motioned to table the discussion, and Brian Fike seconded the motion.

The motion to table the vote for the FY2025 Priority Listing was passed unanimously.

#### **Point in Time and Housing Inventory Counts**

One Night Counts each year usually in the last 10 days of January:

- Waivers are allowed for unanticipated winter events
- **BoS received a waiver for February 4th!**

## Important community data for funding, stakeholders, and governance

- Deep data: covers HMIS and non-HMIS projects
- Consistent data: completed every year
- Consequential data: used by HUD, ESG Office, and others to determine funding for regions

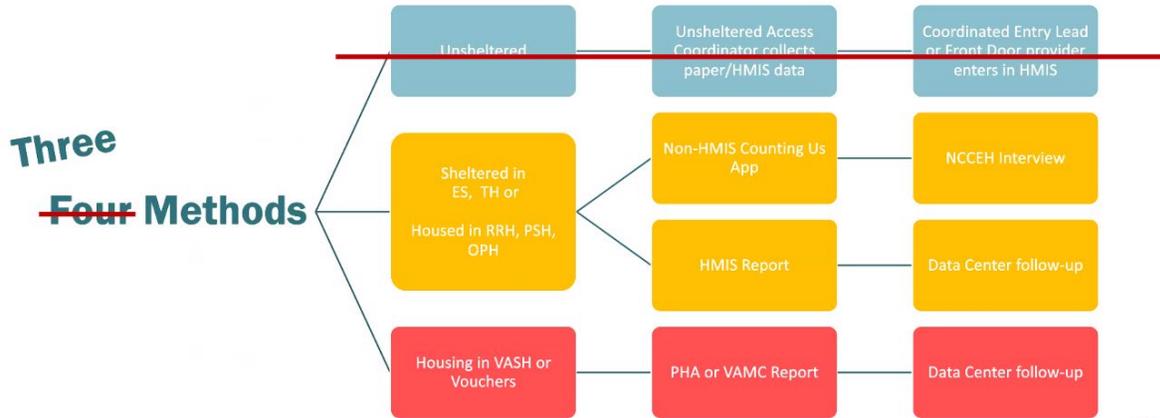

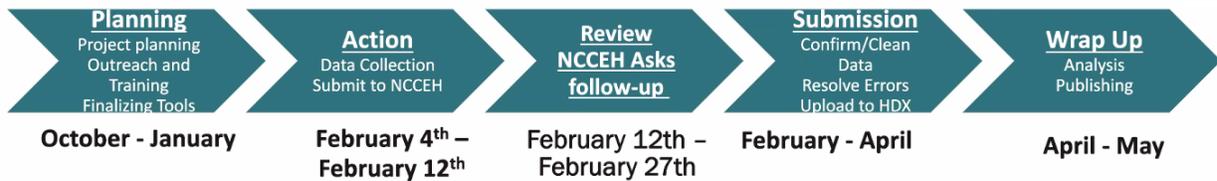

Amber asked whether data from previous years would be used for the unsheltered count, or if there would be an opportunity to submit unsheltered data at a later time.

Andrea explained that no comprehensive unsheltered data will be submitted to HUD this year. Typically, HUD only requires an unsheltered count every other year; however, the Balance of State has historically conducted the unsheltered count annually because of its importance for outreach efforts and the additional data benefits that an annual count provides.

### Next Year Considerations

Is there a role for the new Governance Board Executive Committee to review PIT night changes due to exceptional circumstances?

How many regions or counties would need to be out of commission to delay?

- This year, we used the statewide State of Emergency and widespread outage projections for the move
- This year, we heard from CE Leads and Unsheltered Access Coordinators that Regions 4, 6, 11, and 12 have significant inaccessible areas

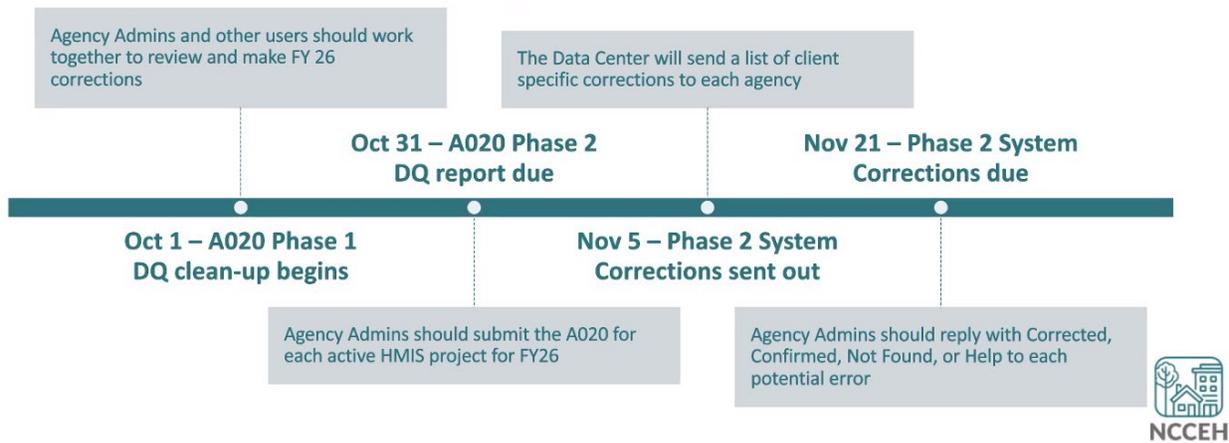

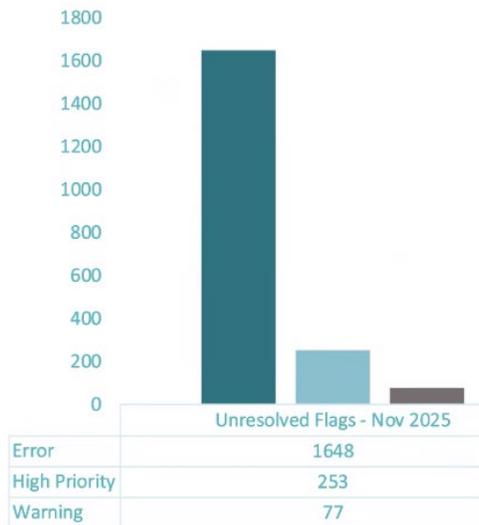

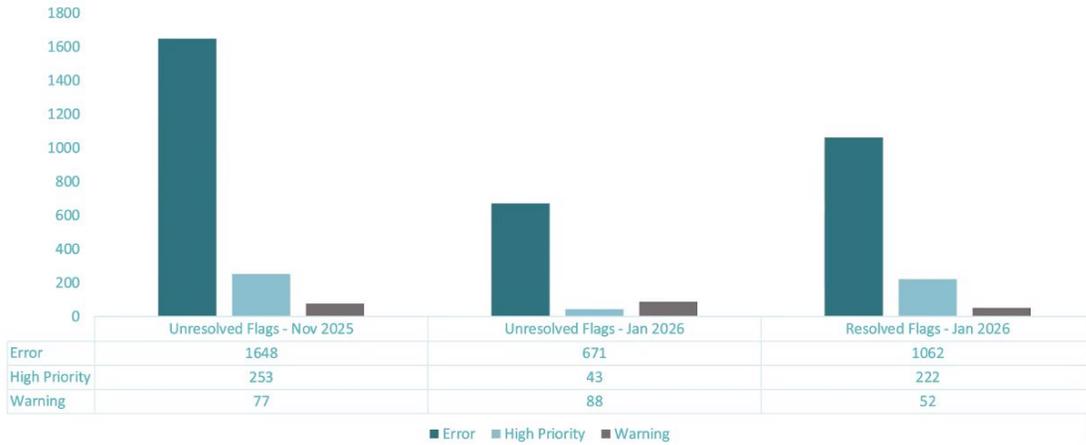
## Fall Federal Reporting: LSA/SPM Corrections

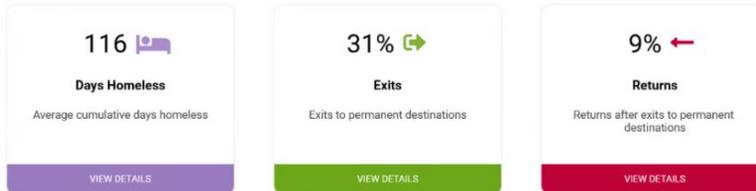

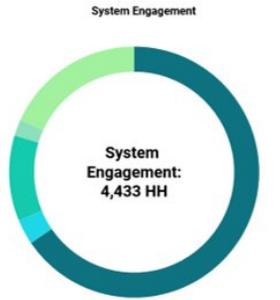

## Definitions:

**First Time:** No enrollments in ES, SH, TH, RRH:H, or PSH projects in two years prior.

**Re-engaging:** New enrollments in ES, SH, TH, RRH:H, or PSH projects after a period without service

**Continuously homeless:** Sequential or continuing enrollments without a Move-in in ES, SH, TH, RRH:H, or PSH projects

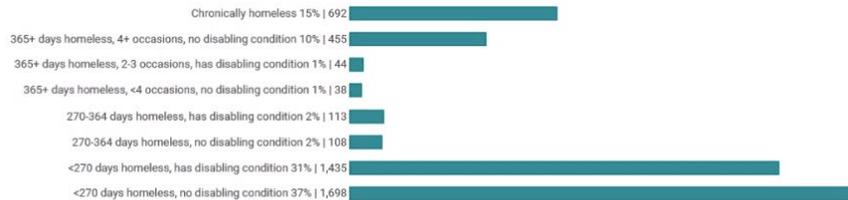
