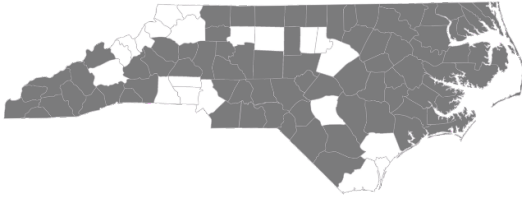

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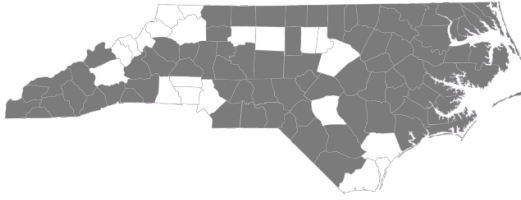

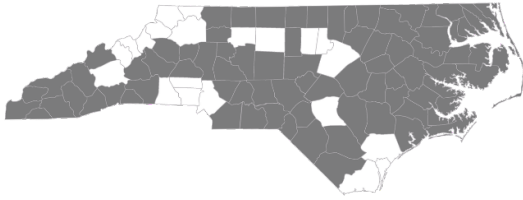

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Back@Home Update

During the first two years of the B@H program, the program relied heavily on ERA funding (flexible funding). While using this funding, the program was able to fill its Rural Rapid Re-Housing (RRH) slots quickly, and many households have remained in the B@H program for 12–24 months.

However, the ERA funding ended on September 30, 2025. When that funding ended, the program realized that there were more households enrolled in RRH than the amount allowed under the CoC funding allocation. Although the B@H program successfully served many households, too many had been enrolled compared to the funding available.

In January, the financial director notified staff that the remaining funding would run out within 30 days. Households were not exited on February 28 as originally anticipated, but the program encountered administrative challenges, including late rent and utility payments. When households were initially notified that their assistance would end, their assistance agreements effectively became obsolete. Once it was determined that additional funds were available, the program had to recreate agreements with landlords.

HUD is now working very closely with the B@H program moving forward. Under program requirements, households will contribute 30% of their income toward rent. A large number of households are also exiting the program successfully (for example, those who now have income, have received housing vouchers, or have other stable housing options). In total, this includes around 100 households.

Households have been fully cooperative with Coordinated Entry (CE) case conferencing. The B@H program is part of the larger Balance of State (BoS) program and operates across all regions, so staff should be participating in case conferencing in all regions.

At this time, there have been no evictions and no loss of financial assistance. Staff are working closely with all households to help them prepare to transition by July 1.

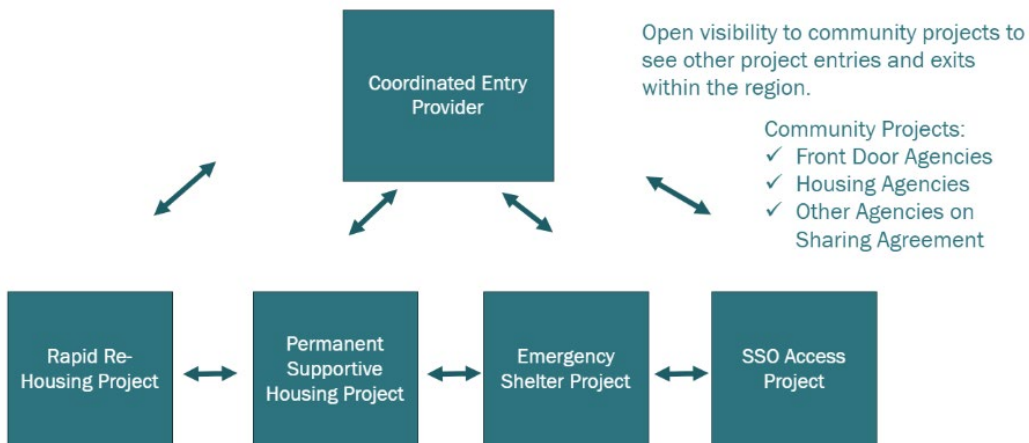
Bonnie asked a question regarding RRH households who were still unhoused. Staff explained that because the program cannot accept new referrals, those households were exited from RRH and instead enrolled in Supportive Services Only (SSO).

Case Conferencing

What is the goal of case conferencing?

- The primary objective of case conferencing meetings is to house people faster by using the region's by-name list of everyone experiencing homelessness.
- All participants contribute their experience, ideas, knowledge of clients, and institutional resources to figure out new ways of housing people.

A successful case conferencing meeting is one in which everyone at the table shares a sense of purpose and community.

Draft the Agenda (Example)

- Opening/Introductions
- Announcements/Program Updates
- Consultations – Cases that need advice but are not being presented for housing.

- Outreach Updates – Cases that are unsheltered, at-risk of homelessness from Outreach Coordinator
- Prior Meeting Review and Updates - Cases that have been presented and require follow-up; status reports on cases that have been referred to a housing program (ESG RRH, CoC RRH, PSH)
- New Referrals and By-Name List Review – Cases for referral to a housing program
- Adjournment

Planning

- Share the by-name list (securely) with your case conferencing team via email, please make sure it is encrypted/password protected or you take off any names before distribution
- Request updates from agencies
- Emergency Shelters, Transitional Housing, and Street Outreach projects
 - Does the BNL show households your agency is no longer serving?
 - Does the BNL show a complete list for each of the households your agency is currently serving?
 - Does the BNL have correct and updated information for each one of the households your agency is currently serving?
- Permanent Housing projects
 - Does the BNL show households your agency has housed or confirmed are no longer experiencing homelessness?

CE Project Entries

What is needed for a new CE entry:

- The [HMIS Project Start Assessment for SSO–CE](#) includes all questions for data entry
- CE Leads are responsible for all appropriate intake questions about demographics, current living situation, income, non-cash benefits, etc.
- If the data is not collected and/or entered by the Front Door provider, the A020 will flag the missing or incorrect data for both the Front Door provider and the Coordinated Entry project.
- If data is not collected by the Front Door Provider, CE Leads should follow-up with the client to complete the intake.
- Collecting this information ensures consistent HMIS data, which supports coordinated service delivery, reporting requirements, and system planning across homelessness programs.

Mary Williams asked whether entering a CE event for a client counts as a data referral, or if it simply means the client was entered into Coordinated Entry (CE) in HMIS. Ashley responded that at the start, staff should complete the Current Living Situation assessment.

The Coordinated Entry Council recommended updating the NC BoS CoC Data Quality Standards to include 90-day Current Living Situation updates in HMIS for Emergency Shelters. Michele Welsh made the motion, with Stephanie Flowers seconding the motion; the motion carried.

By Name List – Review and Filter for Referrals

Rapid Rehousing

- Review for eligible current living situation
- Highest HART score (individual and family)
- Unsheltered households
- Longest length of homelessness

Permanent Supportive Housing

- Review for eligible current living situation
- Disability
 - Filter column N to yes
- Length of time homeless
 - Filter column L to yes
 - If column L is blank, filter for the cumulative length of stay (column P) for over 365 days and disability (column N) to yes

Current Living Situation

For Coordinated Entry projects, CLS will be recorded any time any of the following occurs:

- At Project Start
- A Coordinated Entry Assessment or Coordinated Entry Event is recorded
- The client's living situation changes
- Other meaningful interactions with the client (or at least every 90days)

- Outlines strategies and practices proven to increase Veterans' access to benefits and care, and that have directly resulted in the **55.6% reduction in Veteran homelessness** since 2010.

- The [One Team Sustainable Framework](#) promotes the idea that it is a community's collective responsibility – rather than the responsibility of any single program or provider –to end Veteran homelessness

One Team Domains

Domain 1: Leadership Structure: Dedicated cross-partner leadership teams focused on improving services and housing outcomes for homeless and at-risk Veterans.

Domain 2: Outreach, Engagement and Same-Day Access: Coordinated outreach and engagement strategies that ensure all Veterans have direct access to health care and housing services.

Domain 3: BNL Management: Use of BNLs to manage care coordination, prioritization policies and Veteran outcomes.

Domain 4: CE and Housing Focused Systems: Access and referral protocol that expedite housing linkages across access points and partners.

Domain 5: One Team Housing Fundamentals: Elevating coordination referral, enrollment and housing navigation services to expedite housing placements and retention supports.

Domain 6: Case Conferencing and Barrier Busting: Use of community-wide case conferencing to bust barriers and overcome Veteran-level housing challenges and delays in care.

Domain 7: Sustaining Long-Term Tenancies: Coordinated strategies to promote Veteran access to complementary and primary services that support tenancies, with a focus on primary care, income growth support, suicide prevention, and connections to other VA and community – based services and systems

By Name List Management

- VA expects every VA Medical Center (VAMC) to help build and manage a VA BNL using our new VA BNL Template and data quality standards to ensure every Veteran experiencing homelessness in the country is known and on a path toward permanent housing.
- VA expects all VAMCs and their VA-funded partners to use the VA BNL template, either as part of local coordination or to consolidate and report Veteran data, to ensure consistency across all sites, effective no later than December 1, 2025.

By Name List Management

- VA Health Care Centers are currently working with NCCEH to develop a streamlined process for data sharing possibilities.
- Currently, VA relies on each CE Regional Lead to share By Name List's regularly for updates to be manually entered into the required VA Template. This is imperative for Veteran's to receive the critical care they need.
- Please share the By Name List with your VA Point of Contact at a minimum of monthly for this effort.

FY23 SSO-CE APR

The NC BoS CoC CE system achieved several important milestones.

Accomplishments:

- Spent 100%(!!) of FY23 SSO-CE grant & met the CoC spending threshold
- Included CoC-wide goals & regional-level goals in each subgrantee's grant agreement

- Expanded street outreach coverage with an intentional focus on providing CE access to households living unsheltered
- Started collecting more thorough CE data by transitioning CE data to HMIS in all regions

HUD Requires all COC Program grantees to complete an APR at the end of the operating year.

The Annual Performance Report (APR) is a comprehensive report that looks at all the participants served by a project during the reporting period.

- The CoC can use the APR as a helpful tool for agencies to track data quality, ensure accurate reporting, & create project summaries.
- NCCEH can create regional HMIS reporting groups to view CE data at the Regional Committee level.
- The NC BoS CoC FY23 APR reflects data from 12/01/2024 to 11/30/2025 & solely demonstrates CE data (excluding VSP data).

The APR reflects the following:

- Total number of adults served: 7109
- Data quality has an overall low error rate (1 %); however, SSN had an error rate of 10% (likely due data privacy restrictions).
- Out of total number of adults served (7109), 4689 assessments were rerecorded in HMIS.
- 87% of assessed households were placed on the by-name list for prioritization.
- Increased utilization of CE Access Event & CE Referral Event

The CoC continues to seek to improve the CE system in 2025.

Entering the FY24 SSO-CE grant operating period, the CoC worked with the CEC & subgrantees to set goals.

- CoC CE goals added to SSO-CE grant agreements
- Coordinated Entry Data Measured for Timeliness: 100% Project Entry/Start entered into HMIS within 6 days
- Lead the review and update of the Regional Committee's Coordinated Entry Plan to ensure alignment with NC Balance of State CoC policies, HUD requirements, and current regional practices.

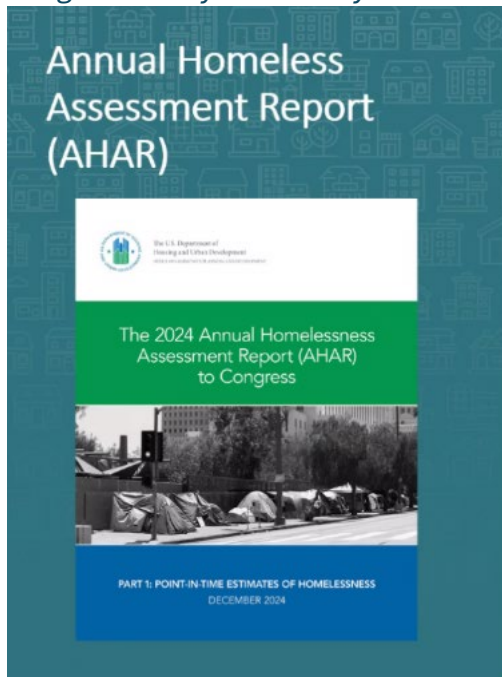

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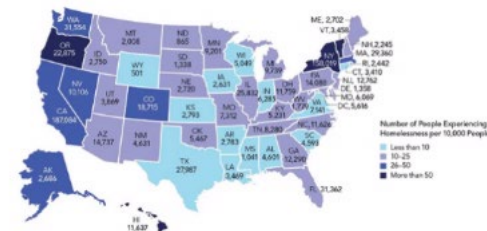

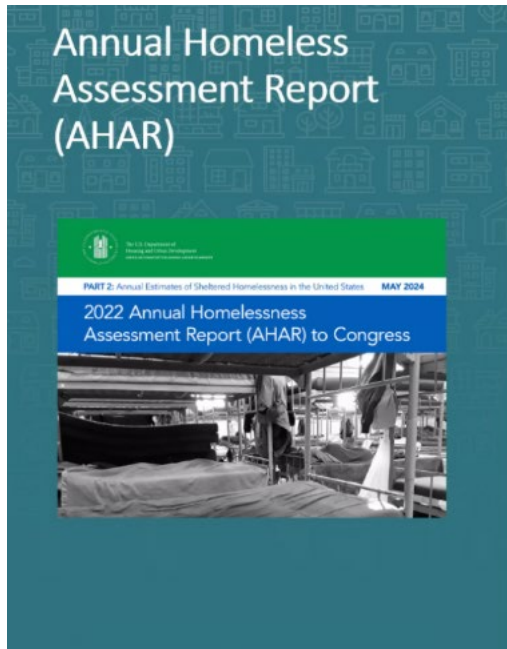

*Most recent is 2024

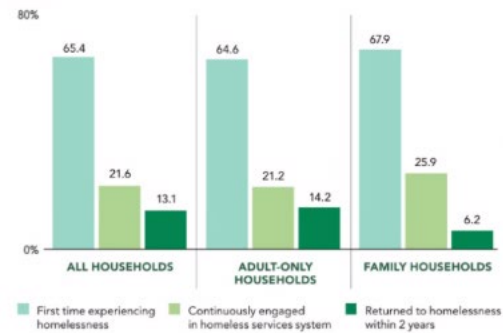

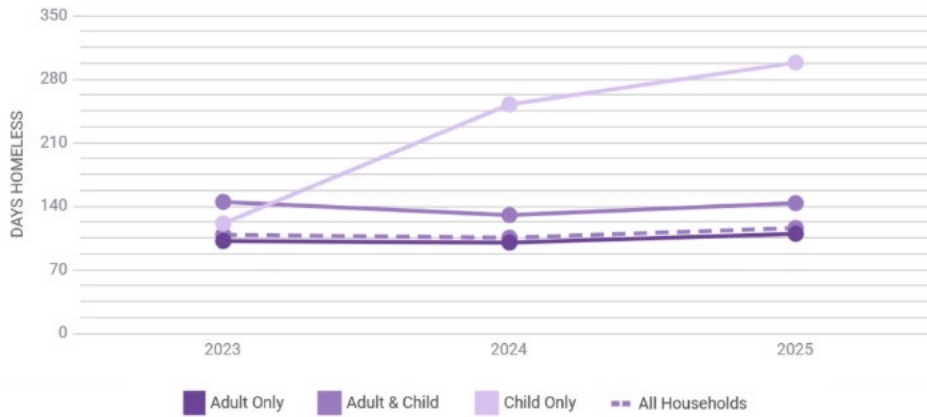

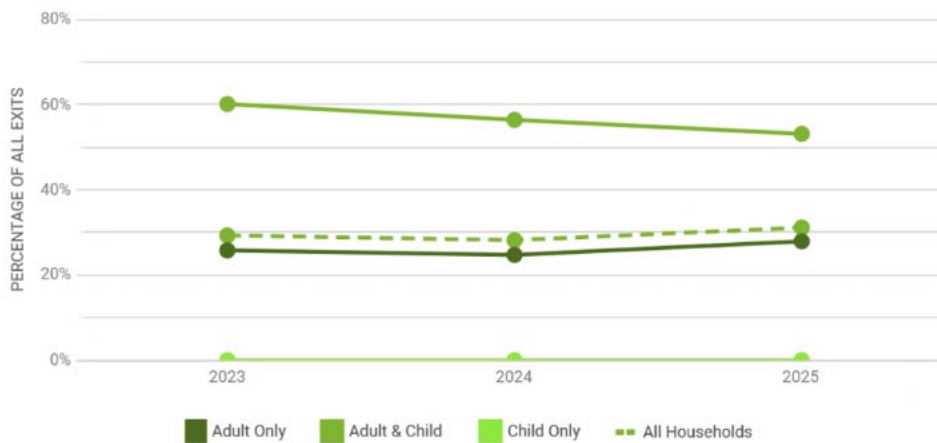

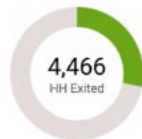

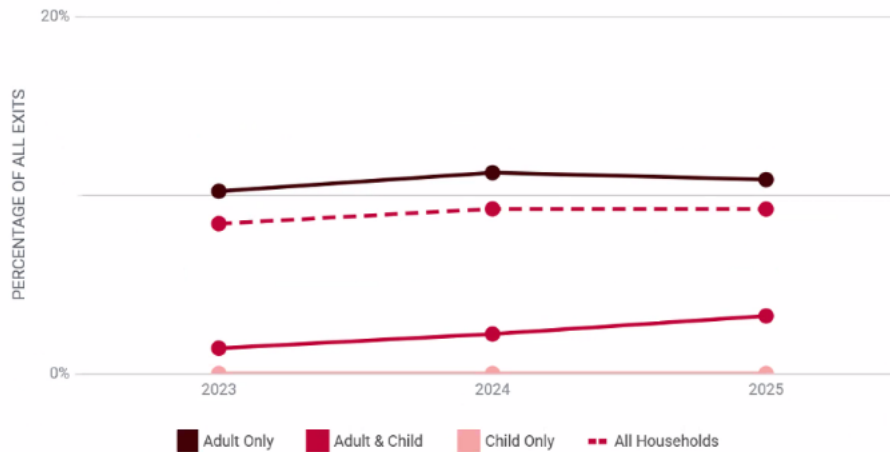

A question was asked about where project types should aim to be in terms of exits to permanent housing. Data Center staff responded that improvement is needed, noting concern about the recent dip in performance. Staff shared that the team plans to dig deeper into project types and their exits to better understand the issue. The performance measure benchmarks for each project type set thus far in the ESG Program Funding Priorities were shared in the chat.

It was noted that within RRH, the length of stay has been increasing due to the growing complexity of cases. Staff elaborated that many participants have needs more aligned with PSH, but are instead being placed in RRH. While RRH is an available option, it is not designed for long-term support, which some individuals require. Staff also mentioned that rising housing costs are outpacing income growth, making it difficult to stabilize households even when programs are doing everything they can.

Staff added that the system feels “clogged,” like a backed-up pipeline. The group generally agreed that increased funding would likely help address these challenges.

A member shared concerns from landlords acceptance of Section 8 or Housing Choice vouchers in a move-on approach, including:

1. Fair Market Rent restrictions
2. Difficulty reaching housing authority/voucher staff—calls and inquiries often go unanswered.

It was also noted issues with the inspection process, including a lack of follow-up compared to PSH programs. She explained that there is no ongoing obligation for Section 8 or Housing Authorities to check in with participants outside of inspections, resulting in less consistent oversight and support than in PSH.

An update to the original FPS schedule is on April 16, regarding the addition of ESG and CoC competition information. HUD Technical Assistance (TA) has offered to support a full overhaul of both the ESG and CoC competition processes for the NC BoS CoC.

A group of NCCEH staff will meet with HUD TA in person from April 8–10 to collaboratively redesign the competition and make it as effective as possible. The goal is to develop new processes that also build greater year-round capacity, including increased training opportunities, deeper data analysis, and more regular engagement with housing support providers.

NC BoS CoC staff did receive an email today from the SNAPS Office regarding information on the FY2026 Registration process for the CoC Program Competition.

As part of this effort, NCCEH will also determine which BoS staff will partner with specific committees moving forward.
