NC SOAR FY Overview

- In December of 2025, NC SOAR partnered with Parkwyn Training and Consulting (PTC) to create an offer the SOAR Plus! Training curriculum to SOAR Providers throughout the state
 - PTC has also partnered with other states to offer the same training system.
- SOAR Providers throughout our country collaborate using a National SOAR Listserv and social media platforms.
- NC SOAR partnered with NextStep Digital and PTC to create an SSI/SSDI Outcome Reporting Tool – Tracking System for organizations across North Carolina to enter, track, and report on SOAR-assisted SSI (Supplemental Security Income) and SSDI (Social Security Disability Insurance) application outcomes.
- **S.O.R.T** is live (as of 5/26/26)
 - NC SOAR will provide a training guide and overview at SOAR Dialogue call in June.



SOAR Plus! Training Stats

- Since December 2025, nearly **30** participants have registered for and completed our SOAR Plus! Training, successfully meeting NC SOAR requirements and begging to actively complete SOAR applications!
- 100 Registrants have completed SOAR Plus! Trainings since the inception of the training tool.
- We offer quarterly SOAR Plus! Trainings each *December, March, June, and September* to support agencies and providers across North Carolina.
- NCCEH will host a SOAR 101 in the July Workshop Series.
- Our goal is to expand these workshop opportunities statewide for agencies interested in learning more about the SOAR model, especially those that may not yet be ready to fully implement SOAR within their organizations.
- We look forward to explaining SOAR through NC, especially in our rural regions where there is a great need for SOAR services.

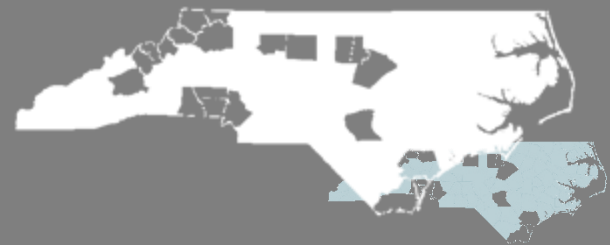


North Carolina is SOARing to Success

- NC SOAR currently has an *approval rate* of 82%
- As of April 2026, North Carolina has:
 - 83 Active SOAR Providers
 - 26 SOAR Providers are **DEDICATED**
 - 52 are part-time, including 4 PATH (Projects for Assistance in Transition from Homelessness) caseworks
 - 3 volunteer SOAR caseworker positions



CoC Competition Update



FY2026 CoC Program Funding Priorities

On Thursday, May 21, our CoC's Funding & Performance Subcommittee met to update our CoC Program Funding Priorities in preparation for the competition. Updates were informed by the FY2025 NOFO, which exhibited HUD's new funding priorities.

- Ensure essential infrastructure is in place, including HMIS and Coordinated Entry
- Reduce unsheltered homelessness and promote trauma-informed care
- Create diverse coverage of all CoC program project types across the CoC
- Funds projects that provide supportive services that promote self-sufficiency and positive outcomes
- Utilize CoC Program funding effectively, including reallocation from projects that have patterns of low spending or poor performance

The Subcommittee also split our document into two documents: the Funding Priorities, and the Project Review and Ranking Policies.



FY2026 CoC Program Scorecards

On Friday, May 22, our CoC's Scorecard Committee met to update our CoC Program New and Renewal Project Scorecards in preparation for the competition. Updates were informed by the FY2026 Funding Priorities.

The number of components included on the scorecard was greatly reduced by identifying components that were a better fit for project monitoring outside of the CoC Program Competition. For example, components that took a specific look at a project's policies and procedures have been removed from the scorecard and will be included in NCCEH's monitoring plan moving forward.

The scorecards were updated with new performance benchmarks and priorities set by the Funding & Performance Subcommittee.

The scorecards were re-organized, grouping together Thresholds, Standards, and Point Value components by project type. They were also built in Excel format for auto-calculations.



FY2026 Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) Released

On Monday, June 1, HUD released the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) on grants.gov to signal the beginning of the FY2026 CoC Program Competition.

All agencies that are interested in applying as a new or renewal applicant should invest in reading through the NOFO, as it contains important information about eligible applicants, eligible project types, and HUD requirements.

NCCEH will be hosting a [FY2026 NOFO Review Webinar](#) on Wednesday, June 10 at 1PM to cover the highlights of the NOFO. This webinar will also help identify our CoC's outstanding questions that need elevation for an answer. Anyone interested is invited to attend.



FY2026 NOFO – First Look

- CoC Bonus Funds will be available to apply to create new projects: SSO-Standalone, SSO-Street Outreach, Transitional Housing, Rapid Rehousing, Permanent Supportive Housing, and SSO-Coordinated Entry*.
- DV Bonus Funds will be available to apply to create new projects that serve survivors of domestic violence: Transitional Housing, Rapid Rehousing, and SSO-Coordinated Entry.
- New TH projects need to offer to participants 20 hours per week of engagement in services. Employment may contribute to the 20 hours. (Down from 40)
- Renewal applicants may still shift 10% of one existing Budget Line Item (BLI) to another eligible BLI during the renewal project application.
- Projects may set preferences for elderly individuals and families (55+) and individuals or families living with a disabling condition.
- TH, RRH, PSH, and SSO projects may serve people who are Category 1, 2, or 4 under HUD's definition of homelessness. (SNOFO PSH must serve 1 & 4, DV Projects must serve survivors who are 1 or 4)



FY2026 NOFO – First Look

- Tier 1 of the Priority Listing capped at 60% of Annual Renewal Demand.
- No cap on permanent housing funding request on the CoC level, but there is a set-aside established for new SSO and TH projects that equates to about 30% of HUD's total CoC Program budget for this competition. This will result in SSO and TH projects more likely to be selected from Tier 2 on the Priority Listing.
- Supportive service required participation is no longer a part of the Project Quality Criteria, but it still must be included on the CoC's scorecard and will be 10% of how projects are awarded off Priority Listing.
- HUD still offering points to CoCs that have 100% (or partial for 50%) of projects requiring participation in services.
- HUD still offering points to CoCs that have substance abuse services available on-site for 30% of projects.
- Expansions will be allowed, including expanding with DV Bonus funds to serve survivors.
- Consolidations will be allowed and are still encouraged by HUD.
- Transition grants will be allowed and require approval by the CoC. Transition grants would function like a new project application.

- Participant will meet Category 2 eligibility, meaning they will imminently lose their permanent housing, have not identified a subsequent resident, and lack the resources and support networks to obtain other housing.
- Participant meets Category 4 eligibility and states at time of TH intake that they are fleeing an experience of domestic violence.
- All referrals to TH will still need to go through Coordinated Entry, though our CoC may consider establishing a local priority to prioritize households being removed from RRH/PSH for referrals to a TH opportunity if needed

Intent to Apply/Intent to Renew

The first **mandatory** step in our local competition is to complete an Intent to Apply/Intent to Renew for CoC Program funds. This form is built in Smartsheet and is due **Wednesday, June 17 by 5PM.**

The links for both the New and Renewal form will be published on our website and sent out through our mailing lists tomorrow by 5pm!

Interested applicants must complete this form by the deadline to be considered for inclusion on our CoC's Priority Listing.

The information provided will help NCCEH verify that you are eligible to apply for CoC Program funding, and all agencies who submit an Intent form will be notified no later than Monday, June 22 by 5 PM of whether their Intent was approved, approved with changes, or rejected. This notification will also include the link to get started in ZoomGrants.

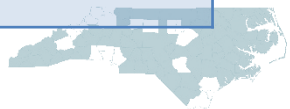

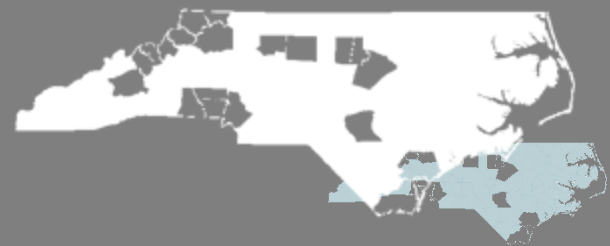

- Ensure you have an active and up-to-date account with SAM.gov. Follow instructions in the NOFO to register if needed.
- Create a login and Applicant Profile in e-snaps, or ensure you can login to your existing account
- Once the official project applications are available in e-snaps, go ahead and get started! You do not need to wait for approval of an Intent to start this application or your Applicant Profile in e-snaps. **DO NOT SUBMIT**, as you will be exporting the finished draft as part of your ZoomGrants application. NCCEH will notify you when to submit.

Our Services

- **Women & Family Shelter** (64 bed)

Rent based housing options for program graduates with limited credit or poor rental histories.
- **Street Outreach** (served 695 individuals through April 26 since launch Nov 22)
Connecting unsheltered homeless citizens with case management and resources in the community they are living in.
- **Men's Shelter** (24-27 bed)
Coming soon. Program based housing for homeless single men.

- **Mobile Pantry**

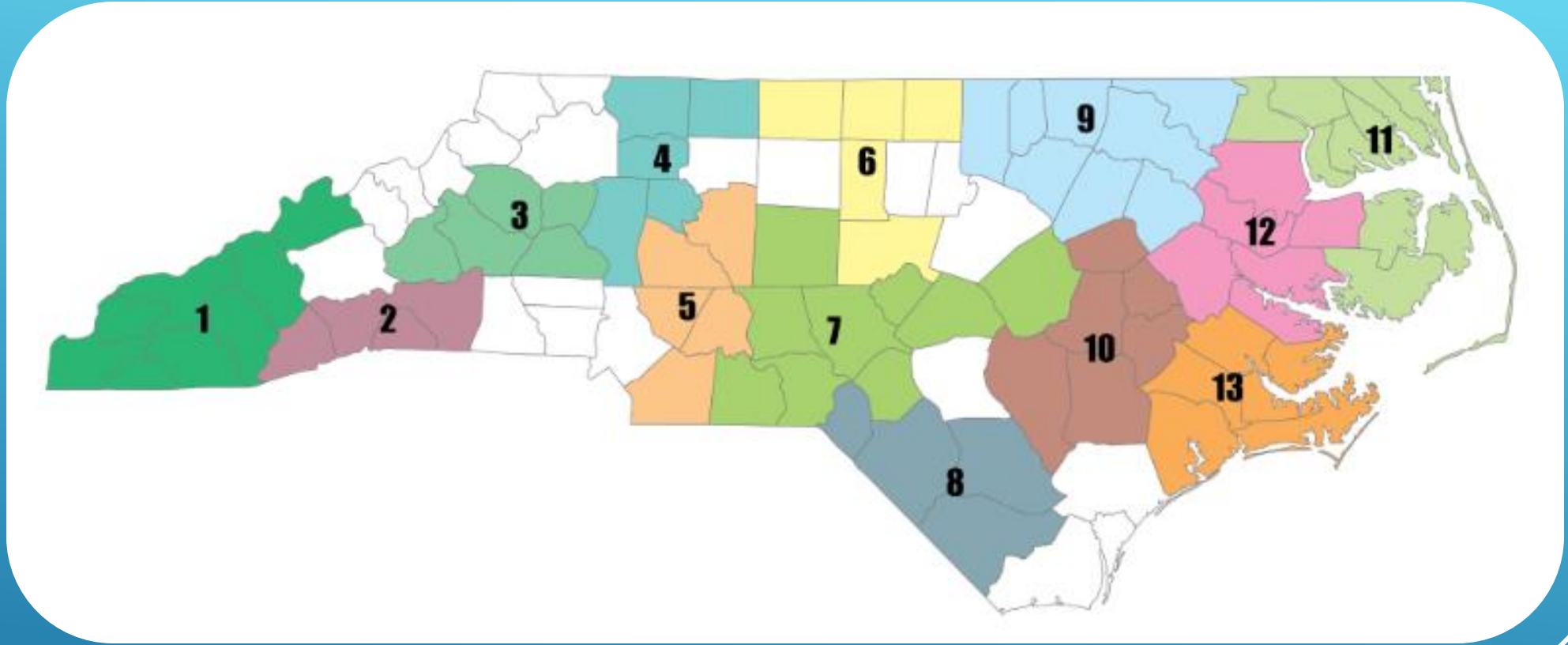

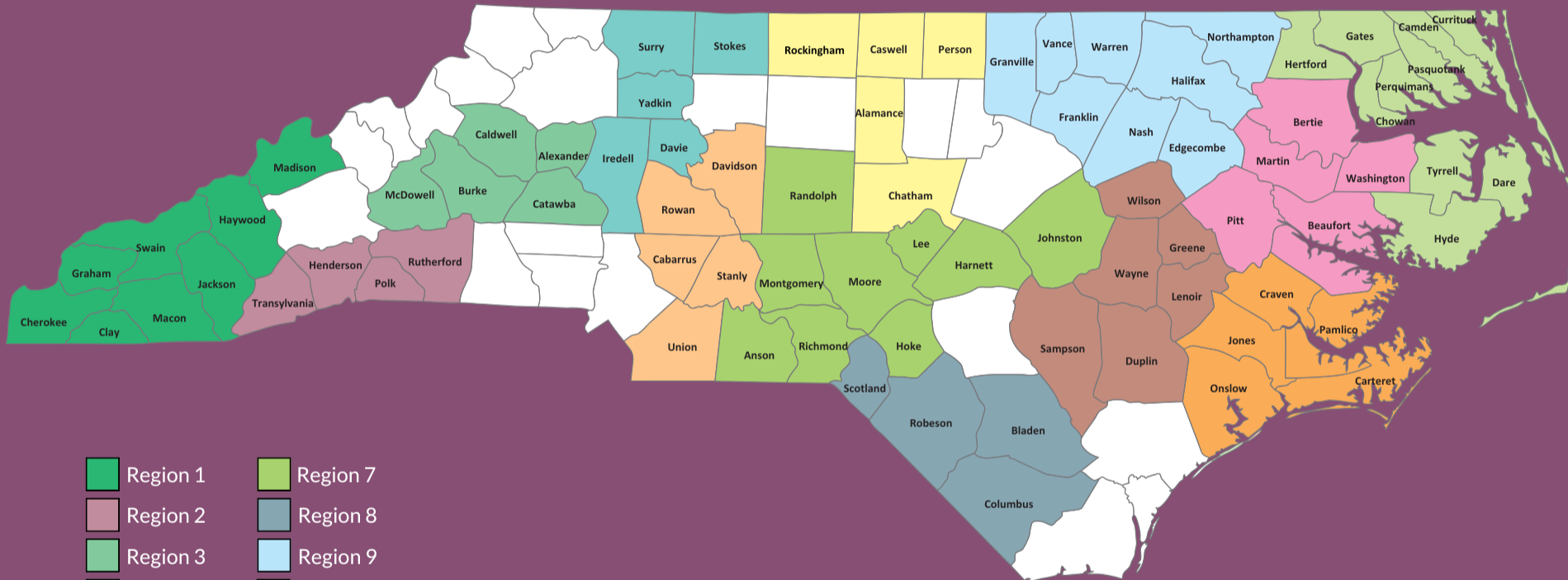
